To achieve its investment objective, the investment strategy is based on active discretionary management.

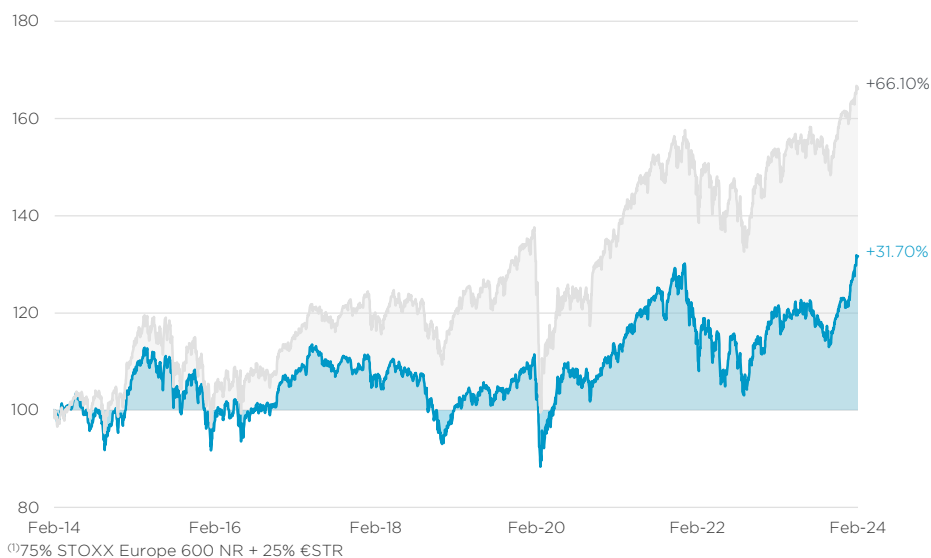

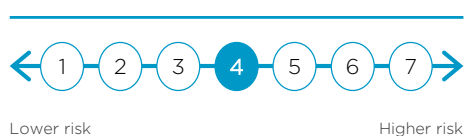

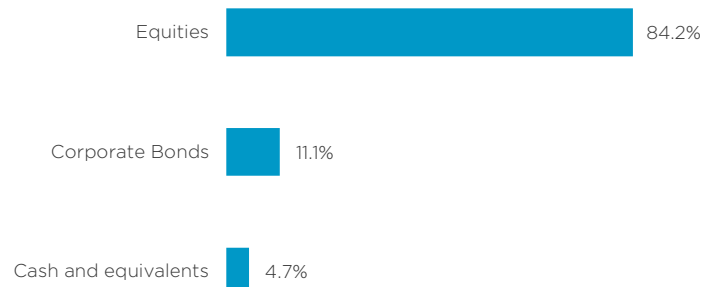

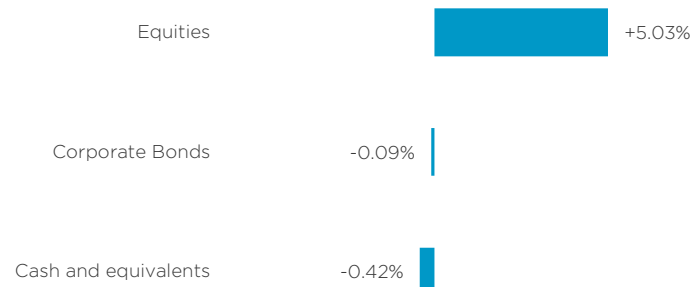

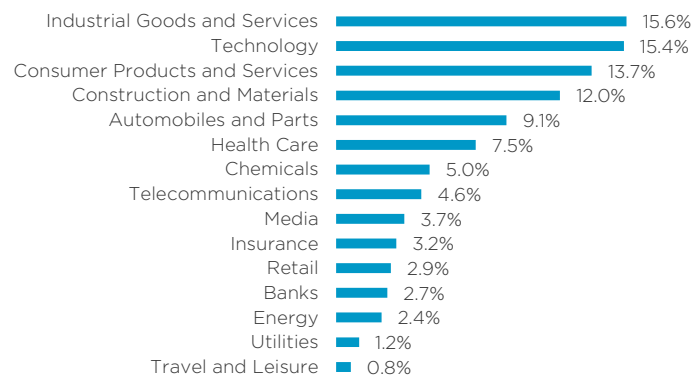

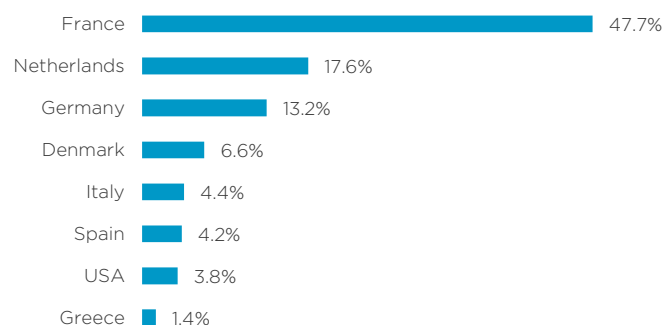

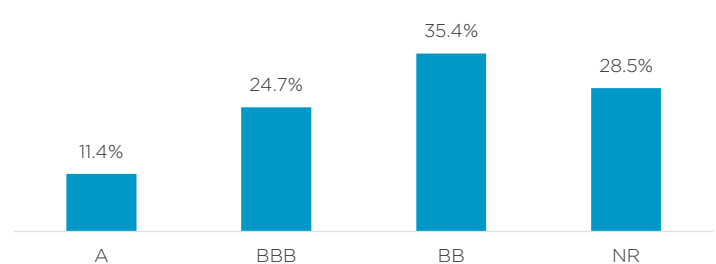

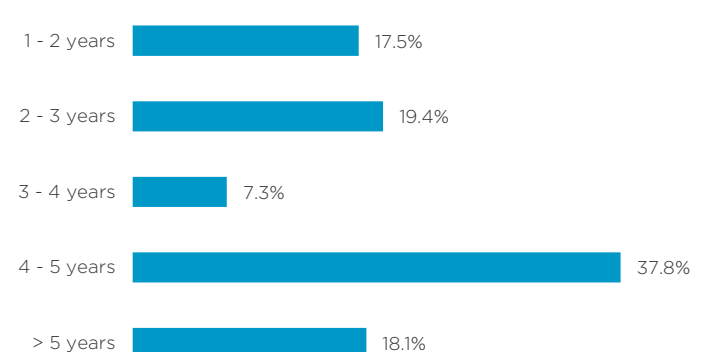
Rating breakdown

Portfolio managers comments

The markets continued to perform well, with the stxx600 rising by 1.84% over the month, setting a new all-time record in the process, as did the other world indices (S&P 500, Nasdaq, Eurostxx 50, etc.). The US indices have risen for the 16th time in the last 18 weeks, a feat not seen since 1971.

Robust macroeconomic data (improvement in real wage growth, consumer confidence, a stable unemployment rate of 3.7%, inventory rebuilding) and solid earnings releases validate the market scenario: a soft landing for the economies against a backdrop of disinflation, even if this is slower than expected (at 3.1% and 3.9% for core inflation in the US), postponing the FED's first rate cut to June with a probability of around 60%.

The positive outlook for liquidity (at its highest since March 2020, with US households and businesses "sitting" on USD 6 trillion) is providing support for risky assets and fuelling the upward movement in the markets.

On the microeconomic side, Nvidia's better-than-expected publication (guidance 2024 raised, on the back of stronger supply and continuing excess demand) fuelled a 4.02% rise in the technology sector, which continues to benefit from the direct consequences of the unbridled growth of AI (with ASML +9.06%, ASM +9.20%, SAP +7.51%).

Publications from Mercedes (EUR 3bn buyback programme announced), Unicredit (EUR 1.9bn profit vs. consensus of EUR 1bn and distribution of 22% of its capitalisation in 2024), Hermès (7-9% price increase in January), Air Liquide (margin guidance raised) and Cap Gemini (results and above-consensus guidance thanks to demand for "GenAI" generative artificial intelligence) also supported the European indices.

Against this backdrop, which remains favourable to risky assets, DNCA Evolutif PEA recorded an increase of +4.10% compared with +1.57% for its benchmark index.

Net exposure to equities remains stable at 78%, of which 60% quality-growth and 40% value-cyclical. Our short position in Eurostxx50 futures stands at 8% of outstandings and we will take advantage of the next phases of market consolidation to reduce this position, given the valuation of the Stxx600 at 13.10 PE 2024 (10-year average at 14.3x) for earnings expected to rise by 5% in 2024 and 9.8% in 2025.

We initiated 2 new positions in Axa (potential for re-rating thanks to the substantial return of cash with a total return of 8% and potential EPS growth of 6.8%) and the IPO of Athens airport (attractive valuation for robust traffic growth of +10% with a dividend yield of 7.2% for 2025).

On the bond side, our exposure (11.5% of the fund) is essentially made up of European corporate bonds with an average maturity of 4.60 years, offering an attractive yield, up slightly from 4.32% to 4.65%.

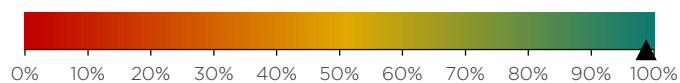

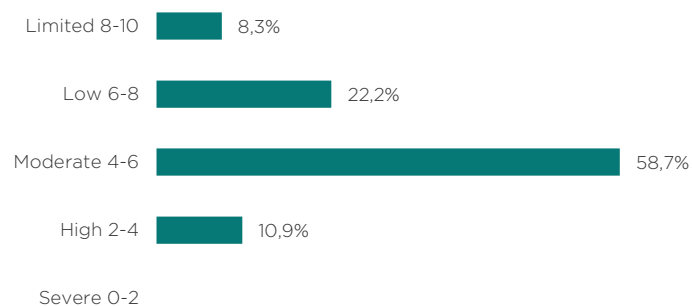

Average Responsibility Score: 5.5/10

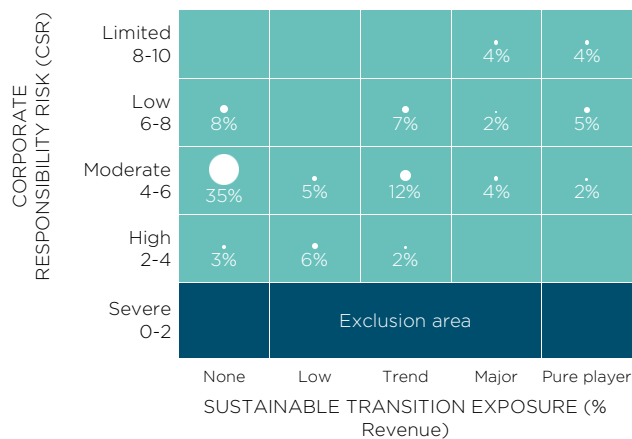
Responsibility risk breakdown⁽¹⁾



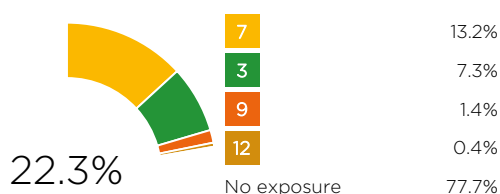
Selectivity universe exclusion rate



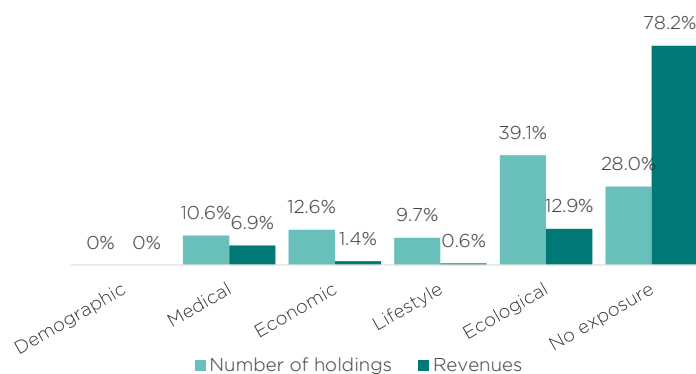
Transition/CSR exposure⁽²⁾

Analysis methodology

We develop proprietary models based on our expertise and conviction to add tangible value in the selection of portfolio securities. DNCA's ESG analysis model, Above & Beyond Analysis (ABA), respects this principle and offers a rating that we control the entire construction. ⁽²⁾ The ABA Matrix combines the Responsibility Risk and the Sustainable Transition exposure of the portfolio. It allows us to map companies to be mapped using a risk/opportunity approach.

Glossary

Beta. Measures the average extent to which a fund moves relative to the broader market. The beta of a market is 1. A fund with a beta of more than 1 moves on average to a greater extent than the market. A fund with a beta of less than 1 moves on average to a lesser extent. If beta is a minus number, it is likely that the stock and the market move in opposite directions.

Convertible Bond. Hybrid securities that have both bond and equity characteristics. Convertible bonds make periodic interest payments like a bond, but bondholders also get an option to exchange their bonds for a specified number of shares of common stock. Convertible bonds typically carry lower coupon rates, thus reducing the corporation's cost of borrowing.

Correlation coefficient. The correlation coefficient is a measure of correlation. It is used to determine the relationship between two assets over a given period. A positive coefficient means that the two assets move in the same direction. Conversely, a negative coefficient means that the assets move in the opposite direction. The correlation or decorrelation can be more or less strong and varies between -1 and 1.

Delta. The delta of a position expresses the change in the price of an option when its underlying asset price varies. It corresponds to the derivative of the theoretical value of the option relating to the price of the underlying asset.

Maturity. The time when a bond or other debt instrument is due to for redemption (is due to mature); or the length of time between the issue of such an instrument and the date it is due for redemption (the maturity date).

Sensitivity. The sensitivity of a bond measures the change in its percentage value induced by a given change in interest rates.

Sharpe Ratio. A way of measuring the historical risk-adjusted return on an investment. It is the average previous return minus the risk-free return, divided by the standard deviation (a measure of risk that looks at the diversion of actual returns from expected returns).

Sharpe Ratio. The Sharpe ratio measures the excess return over the risk-free money rate of an asset portfolio divided by the standard deviation of that return. It is therefore a measure of the marginal return per unit of risk. It is used to measure the performance of managers with different risk policies.

Tracking error. Tracking Error is a measure of how closely an investment portfolio follows the index against which it is benchmarked. It is the difference in the return earned by a portfolio and the return earned by the benchmark against which the portfolio is constructed. For example, if a bond portfolio earns a return of 5.15% during a period when the portfolio's benchmark (say, for example, the Lehman Brothers Index) produces a return of 5.06%, the tracking error is .09%, or 9 basis points.

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
