Investment objective

The investment objective of the Sub-Fund is to outperform the MSCI Emerging Markets Index over its recommended minimum investment period of five (5) years. At the same time, the Sub-Fund respects a Sustainable and Responsible Investment (« SRI ») approach through integration of Environmental, Social and Governance (« ESG ») criteria in fundamental analysis, portfolio ESG score target, and responsible stewardship (voting and engagement).

To achieve its investment objective, the investment strategy is based on active discretionary management.

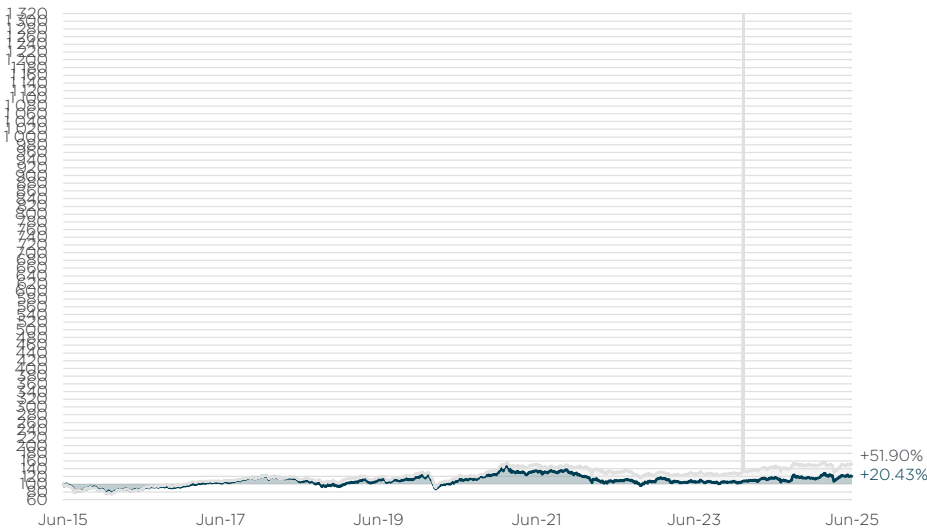

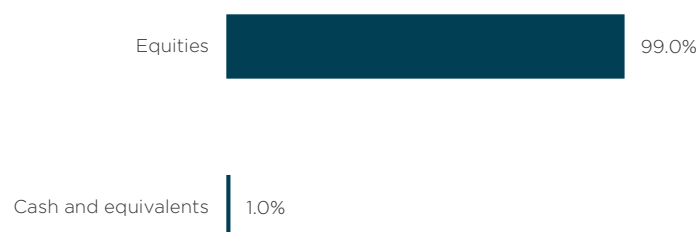

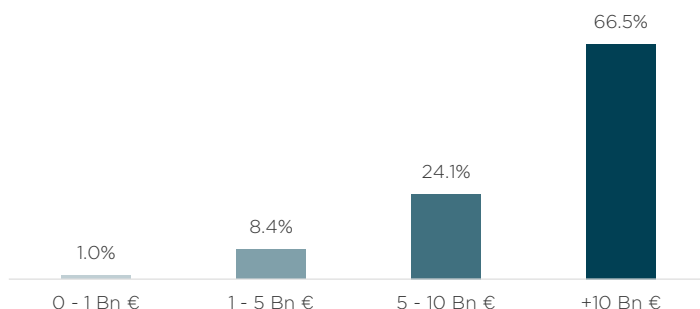

Portfolio managers comments

Despite the strong rebound of the US stock market, the USD continued its downward trend, with a cumulative decline of 11% for the DXY since the beginning of the year. At the same time, in addition to the EUR (+13.7%) and the JPY (+9.1%), some emerging market currencies have also rallied strongly, particularly Latin American currencies such as the BRL and MXN, up +13.6% and +10.9% respectively. The TWD and KRW both rose by 9%. The South African rand was up 6.6%, as was the Malaysian ringgit, up 4.0%. However, the CNY rose by less than 2% and the HKD fell by 1% (against the USD) after the collapse of HIBOR, despite the same pressure from the US administration on the trade surplus. This is probably due to the increased levies in bilateral discussions assumed by China (necessity and irreplaceable nature of Chinese exports to the US; exports of rare earths, essential for high-tech industries). Given the relatively large devaluation against the currencies of other trading partners, this certainly provides a short-term boost to its export industries, thereby supporting its fragile economic recovery in the short term. In our view, the CNY should eventually normalize against its "basket of currencies", but the timing will be decided and managed by the Chinese government. In the meantime, despite the "Deep Seek moment" at the beginning of the year, the Hang Seng Index's performance was much more modest in euros (the currency in which our fund is denominated), with a total return of just +7.5%, while its performance in local currency was more impressive, at +23.0%. The best-performing markets since the start of the year are those whose currencies have strengthened: MSCI Brazil +14.8%, MSCI Mexico +13.4%.... and MSCI Korea +22.8%, with a significant catch-up in June (+13.2% in one month following the presidential election and pending the revision of the commercial code, which could lead to more measures to improve shareholder value, the absence of which explains the long-term discount of the Korean market).

Over the month, DNCA Invest Global Emerging Markets returned +0.24%, compared with +2.53% for its benchmark index. This underperformance was mainly due to our stock selection in Korea, despite our overweight. In the phase of significant recovery, quality growth stocks (such as those we hold) generally underperformed. The fund also suffered from its overweight in China, and more specifically from the negative currency impact, as described above. We believe that this relative weakness in the yuan will eventually reverse, as it was managed for a temporary purpose. Our underweight in Taiwan has also been painful in terms of currency exposure (TWN rose almost 10% against the euro over the month) and the rebound in artificial intelligence technology-related stocks. In terms of contribution to equities, the most damaging were BYD and China Resources Beer. BYD shares retreated from new highs, reflecting criticism from domestic peers over its pricing strategy and a weakening electric vehicle market in China. We don't think BYD is responsible for all the complaints, but it does reveal a consistent practice of excessive competition in the industry, which should be corrected over time. If this happens, it will be a great advantage for the industry leader like BYD. After all, the company's real lucrative potential will come from overseas markets, where the same car can be sold for two or three times more than in its home market. China Resources Beer has been weak, as consumption is still struggling to recover. At company level, its chairman, who has played a key role in the company's past success, recently sold company shares, reinforcing rumours that he would be leaving the business. This certainly adds uncertainty to the stock. However, given its attractive valuation and the limited risk of a further downward revision, we remain convinced to own the company, which has one of the best franchises (stable competitive landscape, extensive regional distribution networks as a barrier to entry) in China's consumer staples sector. Among the positive stock picks, Xiaomi's share price had a decent run following the successful launch of YU7, its first electric SUV, and its second car model after SU7, an electric sedan.

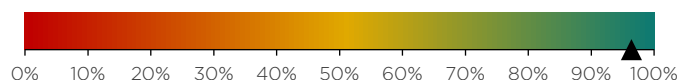

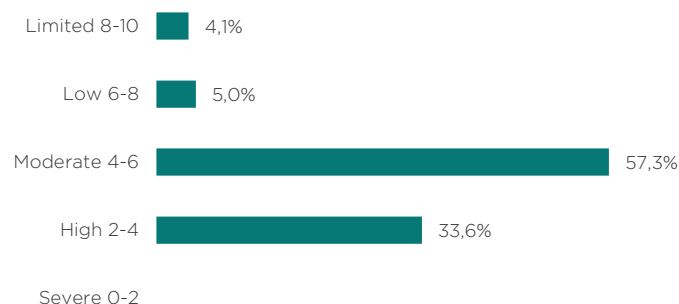

ABA coverage rate⁺ (96.4%)

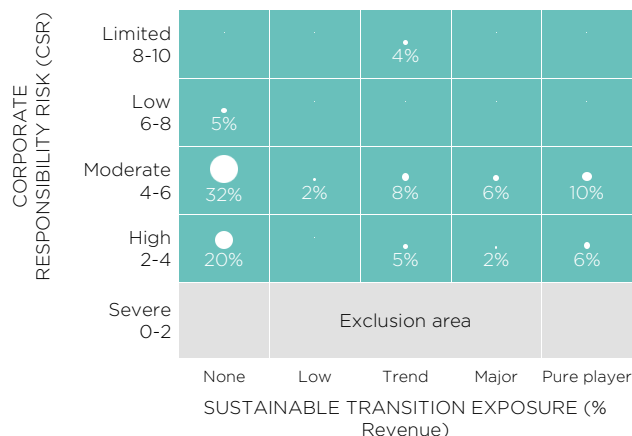

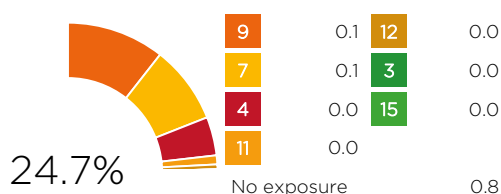
Responsibility risk breakdown⁽¹⁾



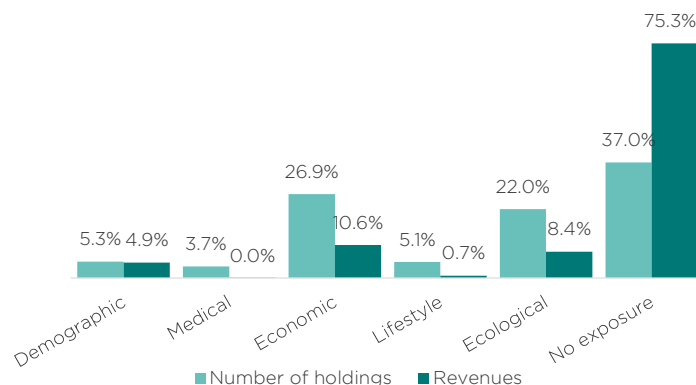
Transition/CSR exposure⁽²⁾

Glossary

Beta. Measures the average extent to which a fund moves relative to the broader market. The beta of a market is 1. A fund with a beta of more than 1 moves on average to a greater extent than the market. A fund with a beta of less than 1 moves on average to a lesser extent. If beta is a minus number, it is likely that the stock and the market move in opposite directions.

Correlation coefficient. The correlation coefficient is a measure of correlation. It is used to determine the relationship between two assets over a given period. A positive coefficient means that the two assets move in the same direction. Conversely, a negative coefficient means that the assets move in the opposite direction. The correlation or decorrelation can be more or less strong and varies between -1 and 1.

Dividend yield. Annual dividends per share / Price per share

EV (Enterprise Value). Market value of common stock + market value of preferred equity + market value of debt + minority interest - cash and investments.

ND/EBITDA (Net Debt / EBITDA). A measurement of leverage, calculated as a company's interest-bearing liabilities minus cash or cash equivalents, divided by its EBITDA. The net debt to EBITDA ratio is a debt ratio that shows how many years it would take for a company to pay back its debt if net debt and EBITDA are held constant.

P/B. The Price to Book Ratio is the ratio of the market value of equity (market capitalisation) to its book value. It is used to compare the market valuation of a company with its book value.

P/CF (Share price/Cash Flow per Share). The price-to-cash-flow ratio is an indicator of a stock's valuation.

PER (Price Earnings Ratio). A company's share price divided by the amount of profits it makes for each share in a 12-month period. PE ratios are normally calculated on the base of all the profit made in the period, whether or not the profit is paid out to shareholders in that period.

ROE (Return On Equity). The amount of net income returned as a percentage of shareholders equity. Return on equity measures a corporation's profitability by revealing how much profit a company generates with the money shareholders have invested.

Sharpe Ratio. A way of measuring the historical risk-adjusted return on an investment. It is the average previous return minus the risk-free return, divided by the standard deviation (a measure of risk that looks at the diversion of actual returns from expected returns).

Sharpe Ratio. The Sharpe ratio measures the excess return over the risk-free money rate of an asset portfolio divided by the standard deviation of that return. It is therefore a measure of the marginal return per unit of risk. It is used to measure the performance of managers with different risk policies.

Tracking error. Tracking Error is a measure of how closely an investment portfolio follows the index against which it is benchmarked. It is the difference in the return earned by a portfolio and the return earned by the benchmark against which the portfolio is constructed. For example, if a bond portfolio earns a return of 5.15% during a period when the portfolio's benchmark (say, for example, the Lehman Brothers Index) produces a return of 5.06%, the tracking error is .09%, or 9 basis points.
